Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

Since the start of the sports grant Knowleswood Primary School has developed sport by:

- Specialist PE teacher employed Specialist PE Teacher developed skill in Sensory Motor Systems to support children with SEND and Underdeveloped Sensory Motor Systems.
- Developing teaching and learning in sport so that all pupils receive quality sports lessons.
- Raised the profile of PE and Health and Wellbeing across school and with families.
- Developed coaching and participation in a range of competitive sports, including traditional and non-traditional sports within the local and wider community, creating opportunities for children to be inspired and aspire to achieve.
- Given opportunities for focus groups of children, 'SEND, Young Girls, Disadvantaged Boys' to take part in a wide range of sporting experiences to improve self-esteem, and mental health.
- Launched 60Minutes Active to embed active lifestyles within our children.
- Provided a PE kit for children of families requiring support, to promote equity and equality of access equality.
- Increased taught PE sessions in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 to two lessons a week.
- -Timetabled lunchtime games and sports to develop a wider range of skill and opportunity for internal sports competitions (Triathlon, Wimbledon, Dance Festival)
- Receiving Gold for the School Games Mark

Continue to increase the participation in fitness activities outside the pupils' normal PE time with our 60Minutes Active Challenge. For example, a more structured school breakfast club, lunchtimes and after school.

- Further, raise the profile of sport in school, leading to increased participation of all pupil groups.
- Specialist PE teachers continue to deliver CPD with teachers to plan high quality PE lessons and to ensure confidence in teaching PE increases.
- External Specialist to come into school to further inspire children to develop higher expectations for themselves.
- Purchase Football Kits in KS1 and 2 for further tournaments.
- Build SEND links with Gym Magic to support underdeveloped sensory motor systems and high expectations for SEND pupils.
